And this season is constructed around that most magic of themes – love. I celebrate it, practise it and fight for it. And I don't know about you…but I need it!



#### Introduce yourself and your role, how long you've been at the Globe:

Marion Marrs Friend to the stars and Kristy Bloxham. Marion has worked here for eight years and Kristy just over a year.

#### Outline your roles at the Globe:

Marion is the Company Stage Manager and Kristy is her Deputy. We look after the acting companies and stage management for each show. On a normal day we work from midday until just after the evening show starts, on a busier day like a tech day or first day of rehearsals we can be in from 9.30am until 10.30pm. I think we are both night owls so the mornings can hurt a little.

#### Explain an average day of yours:

We both check our emails on the train on the way in so we know what we'll be dealing with when we get in. On a daily basis we have to check in with the cast, read rehearsal notes, fight and show reports, and front of house reports from the night before. We ensure that all is ok with the performance for that day and look after the Stage Management and company's needs. We get involved with anything that may involve the company from helping out with Q&A's, the Friends meet the cast, juggling spaces with Education, sometimes fight calls in exhibition, to being involved in all sort of things from the programme to payroll.

#### What is your biggest challenge?

Time juggling, because we often like to be in all the places all of the time.

#### What is the most exciting part of your roles?

First performances, to see all the work that we've been leading up to pay off and the buzz from the audience. We love to see the actors' faces as they experience their first Globe audience. Also the brilliant all weather conditions from actors being too cold needing hot water bottles and blankets or being too hot meaning cold flannels and ice pops!

#### Tell us something people wouldn't think was part of your job or wouldn't know about you:

People are often surprised that we are involved in all the shows that happen and not just the ones are that are currently playing. Also that Marion could feed most of the summer season with her home grown allotment veg, and Kristy can do a mean tap dance.

Both people were full of life, energy and I couldn't help but think about everything they wouldn't get to do, dreams that would go unfulfilled, places they wouldn't see. This was a turning point and I decided to do something positive out of such sadness. And so the Year of Challenges was born.
