ABSENT AUGUST, AND SUPER SEPTEMBER!

Welcome back to Much Ado about Stewarding! Apologies for our brief hiatus last month, but never fear we are back with exciting updates, news and stories from across the Globe...

Since our last newsletter it was announced that we have a new Artistic Director Designate: Michelle Terry. Michelle will take on the role of Artistic Director from April 2018. An Olivier Award-winning actor and writer, Michelle is well-known to the Globe's stage, having starred as Rosalind in As You Like It (2015), as Titania/ Hippolyta in A Midsummer Night's Dream (2013) and as the Princess of France in Love's Labour's Lost (2007). She also directed Richard III, King John and As You Like It for The Complete Walk (2016), a series of short films created as part of the Globe's celebration of the 400th anniversary of Shakespeare's death. We are sure you will all make Michelle feel welcome, as she joins us to begin planning her 2018 summer season.

This month we open Boudica in the Globe, Director Eleanor Rhode and writer Tristan Bernays have promised us: 5 acts, 3 battles, 2 torture scenes and 1 goddess! Tristan described the show as 'an ancient history play, seen through the lens of modern London'. The show also features an innovative design from Tom Piper (former Designer in Residence at the RSC), which will involve some impressive transformations and a zip wire!

In September we will host our first ever live cinema broadcast. Our productions have of course been pre-recorded before, and you can find a whole catalogue of productions on our GlobePlayer, and many of you will remember stewarding our live-broadcast via the BBC for

Shakespeare Lives 2016 last year. This is the first time we have broadcast live into cinemas! King Lear will be broadcast live in over 300 cinemas across the UK & Ireland for one night only on 21 September 2017 at 7.30pm.

This month we also welcome Rosie Lawton to our team as our new Assistant Volunteer Manager. Rosie is looking forward to meeting you all, and I'm sure you will make her feel welcome and embrace her as part of the team.

BUILDING OPERATIONS

The Building Operations team are responsible for the management of the whole site of Shakespeare's Globe Trust – including the Sackler Education studios and 135 Park Street.

We have a very complicated job with a lot of different responsibilities. We look after the Fabric of the buildings, the bricks and mortar, rooves, windows and doors. We also look after the building services, the plumbing, heating, electrics and air conditioning and this is pretty complicated. There are 11 air handling units, 2 chillers, 6 boilers and all the associated pumps, valves, pipework and ducting which keeps everything circulating and flowing to where it needs to get to.

The 'modern' concrete and glass roofed structures cleaners, waste disposal, the photocopiers and were built quite cheaply and are now fairly tired so although we've upgraded a lot of the main plant, the boilers and fan motors, a lot of the pipework, ductwork and the fabric of the building itself is pretty tired and it's also heavily used, a lot more than it was designed for. So we've got a lot of leaks, and there's a fairly frequent list of repairs and breakages that we have to tackle as part of our daily work.

On the other end of the scale we're also responsible for making the building work operationally. We look after everything from the stationary orders, the tea and coffee, the access passes, keys and locks all of the little things that let people into and out of the building and go about their daily jobs.

We also have the very important responsibility for making sure everyone is safe and that the Shakespeare's Globe Trust is compliant with the law! We're responsible for the Health and safety of the buildings and everyone in them the fire safety and all the other myriad regulations, from water testing to working at height. There's never a dull moment and there's no two days the same!


Being told by the class teacher in 1949 of Sam's surprise at the lack of a memorial to William Shakespeare in Southwark, and his ideas.
