Producer Matilda tells us all about the exciting events the theatre team are organising for Refugee Week...













Hello, this year, Refugee Week runs from 18 – 24 June, with World Refugee Day on Wednesday June 20th. And we're planning a week's worth of events to celebrate and promote refugee contributions to our community, as well as to our beautiful Globe itself.

From pop-up displays in the Exhibition and Foyer and a one-off free performance by two Palestinian dance companies in the SWP (their first ever public performances), via a woodcut printing workshop with a Syrian artist on the theme of home, a panel discussion with members of the Globe to Globe: Hamlet company and artists from further afield, to a family-oriented day on Sunday 24th featuring a bespoke Storytelling event in the Playhouse and a big collective drawing session in the Underglobe – as

well as performances of the beautiful new play Nanjing and the Read Not Dead, Sir Thomas More – there'll be a lot going on, and with more plans still being hatched, I'm hoping that it will be a full, happy and stimulating week that can draw in the whole organisation.

We'll also be welcoming over 150 people from local refugee communities into the building across the week to see shows and take part in events.

Everything this year is being done on a shoestring and I'm so grateful to the goodwill from across the Globe to make things possible – it's very exciting.
