Getting to Shakespeare's Globe



This is the Foyer. If you need somewhere quiet at any time you can come back out of the Playhouse into the Foyer.



Your ticket will tell you which gallery, bay and row you are in. Once you have found your row you will need to find the part of the bench reserved for you which will match the number on your ticket.



This is the stage. For different plays, designers add pieces of set to make it look different.



These are stewards. You can recognise the stewards by their aprons. The stewards are there to help you. If you feel tired, or need to exit please ask a steward. They can also show you where the toilets are. Stewards are good people to go to if you feel worried about anything in the show.



Relaxed Performance

On Saturday 26 March at 2pm, there will be a Relaxed Performance.

This will mean:

- There will be an open-door policy so that you can come and go as you please.
- Underseating lights will be on low.
- The show has had some changes to reduce loud noises and sudden movements.
- There are ear defenders available in different sizes to borrow from the Welcome Desk in the main foyer.

Show Notes



Times

The show is about 3 hours 15 minutes

There are 3 parts, with 2 intervals:

Part 1: 1 hour

Interval 1: 15 minutes

Part 2: 1 hour

• Interval 2: 15 minutes

Part 3: 50 minutes



Music and sound

There is live music on stage, including singing.

Some music is original. Some is by *The Smiths*.

The actors sometimes talk to each other from behind the audience.

There are loud noises, whispers and shouting.



Lighting

The stage is mostly lit by candlelight.

In part 2 and 3, there are also electric lights.

There are several blackouts. (The underseating lights will be on for the relaxed performance).

There are also times where the lighting changes quickly.

Show Notes



Set: There is a pond in the centre of the stage.

Begins with an Elizabethan feel and moves into modern day over the course of the play. In Act II and III, Hamlet graffities the back wall of the set.

Costume: As with the set, the play begins in the Elizabethan era and moves into modern dress over the course of the play.

As each character connects with Hamlet, and his madness, they become more modern in their dress.


Design: The play starts in a world that feels quite stable, beautiful and tranquil (in costume, set and music).

Hamlet's madness corrupts and infects that world. The music becomes more modern, the costumes more modern and the set becomes chaotic.

Time period: 1700s to modern day.

The Story







Hamlet has been behaving strangely and Claudius asks Hamlet's child-hood friends, Rosencrantz and

Guildenstern, to find out why.

killed him and commands Hamlet to get revenge.

Hamlet sees the ghost of his father. The ghost tells him that it was his brother Claudius, the new king, who



A group of travelling actors visit the castle and Hamlet asks them to per-form a play about a man who murders a sleeping king, to see how Claudius reacts.




Hamlet tells his girlfriend Ophelia that he never loved her and then asks Gertrude how she can be happy when her husband has only just died.



Hamlet Synopsis



The actors perform the story of the murder of a sleeping king and Claudius storms out. This confirms Hamlet's belief that Claudius killed his father.





Hamlet will not tell anyone where Polonius' body is. Claudius sends him to England but he doesn't arrive.

Ophelia's brother, Laertes, comes home and finds Ophelia has gone mad with grief. She kills herself and Claudius and Laertes plot to murder Hamlet.




Hamlet agrees to fight Laertes. During the duel, Gertrude drinks poison and both Hamlet and Laertes are fatally wounded. Hamlet kills Claudius before he dies.


Sonic Story
