SHAKESPEARE'S GLOBE AND TAMASHA ANNOUNCE CASTING FOR HAKAWATIS: WOMEN OF THE ARABIAN NIGHTS

Shakespeare's Globe and Tamasha are delighted to announce the cast and company for the premiere of their coproduction *Hakawatis: Women of the Arabian Nights* by Globe writer-in-residence Hannah Khalil (*The Fir Tree, Henry VIII,* Globe). Tamasha Artistic Director **Pooja Ghai** returns to the Sam Wanamaker Playhouse to direct *Hakawatis* following her acclaimed production of *Lions and Tigers* in 2017. *Hakawatis* opens on 1 December and runs until 14 January.

Hakawati /hakəˈwɑːti/. Noun: Storyteller. From the Arabic terms hekaye meaning story and haki meaning to talk. A tyrant revenges his wife's infidelity by wedding, bedding, and beheading a new bride every day. Years later, only five brides-in-waiting remain. Hannah Khalil's re-telling of this classic story includes writing contributions from Hanan al-Shaykh, Suhayla El-Bushra and Sara Shaarawi, and translations by Hassan Abdulrazzak.

Writer Hannah Khalil says: "It has always baffled me that the 1001 nights story cycle has been presented as a work for children in the West, when the original tales and framing device are so dark and sexual and full of moral ambiguity. So to have the opportunity to reclaim them and reimagine them afresh, working with writing heroines of mine is a great privilege. And to get to do it at the Sam Wanamaker Playhouse - one of the most beautiful theatres in the world under the direction of Pooja Ghai - well it's the stuff of playwrighting dreams!"

Director Pooja Ghai says: "I am thrilled to be returning to the Sam Wanamaker Playhouse to direct Hannah Khalil's Hakawatis – a bold and passionate new play that celebrates the power of storytelling by reclaiming the original tales of 1001 nights. Since the dawn of history stories have created empathy, understanding and community. Here they become the weapon against a King who seeks vengeance, they become tools to subvert the establishment and the patriarchy, they are the rallying cry for united action amongst the women who remain in captivity. They release the hope, nourishment, vulnerability, strength, love and conviction that these women have to change themselves and the world around them through the power of their collective imagination."

The cast of *Hakawatis: Women of the Arabian Nights* comprises **Houda Echouafni** as Wadiha the Dancer, **Alaa Habib** as Fatah the Young, **Laura Hanna** as Zuya the Warrior, **Nadi Kemp-Sayfi** as Akila the Writer, and **Roann McCloskey** as Naha the Wise. Full cast biographies are as follows:

Houda Echouafni will play Wadiha the Dancer. Houda trained with Margie Haber in Los Angeles, The London Centre of Theatre Studies with David Harris and at Method Acting Studio under Sam Runbellow. Roann McCloskey will play Naha the Wise. Roann studied at The University of Kent & Sorbonne Nouvelle. This is her first time working with Shakespeare's Globe. Background Information

Shakespeare's Globe strives to make Shakespeare accessible for all. It is a registered charity and has operated independently since opening in 1997.

Shakespeare's Globe is a world-renowned theatre, education centre, and cultural landmark on the bank of the River Thames in London, UK. Founded by the pioneering American actor and director Sam Wanamaker, our site is home to two venues – the iconic open-air Globe Theatre (1997) and the candlelit indoor Sam Wanamaker Playhouse (2014).

Many of our productions also enjoy an extended life online through our video-on-demand service <u>Globe</u> <u>Player</u>, in cinemas across the UK, and on television. We are also a major venue for concerts and special events, and have produced many world premieres of new plays, several of which have gone on to enjoy success in the West End, on Broadway and beyond.

Our education department has long been one of the most active in the UK. We offer a hugely diverse programme of workshops, public events, university courses, and community projects. Our Guided Tour is award-winning, and our visitors also enjoy our on-site and online shop.

The Globe Theatre (1997) is a unique full-scale replica of Shakespeare's original 1599 Elizabethan open-air

theatre. Our indoor candle-lit Sam Wanamaker Playhouse (2014) is an archetype of an indoor Jacobean theatre.



Tamasha is a dedicated home for both emerging and established Global Majority artists. A powerhouse of new writing, talent development and digital innovation, we platform and invest in stories that celebrate our rich shared histories and cultures. Proudly both artist and audience driven, we're disrupting, dismantling, and inspiring through bold and imaginative storytelling, providing a place to explore our lived experiences and unique perspectives.

We support theatre makers in gaining the skills, knowledge and creative community to create innovative, new work. Our Developing Artists Programme includes masterclasses, showcases, training programmes and networking opportunities, informed by and responsive to the evolving demands of the creative industries.

We collaborate with partners to commission and produce an artistic programme interweaving live and digital productions, such as audio dramas, walking adventures, magazine-style podcasts and annual touring productions. All staged within and beyond traditional spaces.
